They are life members of the American Hemerocallis Society, members of four regional daylily groups, and Exibition Judges. At present, their garden has about 500 cultivars planted or in pots.

DIRECTIONS:

NOTE: At the gate, you will be asked for your destination (Officers Club) and to provide a picture ID for **EVERYONE** in the vehicle. You will also be asked to open all doors, the hood and trunk, and step out of the vehicle while it is inspected.

Enter Fr. Myer at either the Hatfield or Write Gate.

FROM THE SOUTH ON INTERSTATE 95:

Inside the Capital Beltway, 1-95 becomes 1-395. Proceed north toward Washington. Take Exit 8A (7 miles inside the Beltway), marked "Washington Blvd., Route 27." Bear left on the ramp, following the signs. Exit Washington Blvd. to the right at the exit marked "Fort Myer Only." Go through gate at top of exit ramp and take second left turn onto McNair Rd. Brucker Hall is the last building on the left before the stop sign.

FROM THE WEST ON INTERSTATE 66:

Proceed on 1-66 inside the Capital Beltway. Take exit 26 (7 miles inside the Beltway) marked "Route 110 South, Pentagon, Alexandria." Pass the Iwo Jima Memorial on your right, then immediately turn right onto Marshall Drive and continue 3/4 miles to Fort Myer gate.

FROM THE NORTH ON THE CAPITAL BELTWAY (I-495):

Immediately after crossing the American Legion Bridge into Virginia, exit to the right onto the George Washington Memorial Parkway, Exit 14B. Continue to the Exit for Route 50 West which will be just past the exit for the Key Bridge. Proceed west in the right lane to a ramp for Ft. Myer Drive/Meade Street. Make a left turn, pass by the Iwo Jima Memorial on your left, proceed to the stop sign and turn right into Ft. Myer.

FROM D.C.:

Take 1-395 out of the city and into Virginia. Pass the Pentagon and take Exit 8 for Washington Blvd. Proceed on Washington Blvd and take exit marked "Fort Myer Only" on the right.

A yellow-flowered form of *Lilium henryi*

For years I've grown a yellow-flowered form of Lilium henryi in my garden. It's a handsome, graceful plant with large soft yellow flowers; there's really nothing else like it among lilies. In common with so many other Lilium henryi, it has weak stems and requires staking. I don't know where this plant came from. It just appeared one year in the garden. Years later I dug it and gave one of the two bulbs to the late Virginia Queitzsch. I must have been very busy that year because that was the last time I saw my plant. I probably neglected to replant the bulb. When I told Virginia about my loss, she offered a bulblet from her plant. A year or two later while visiting Virginia, she made good on her offer.

You are not likely to see this one at our local shows: it blooms during late July and early August. What should we call this plant? The old name often used was Lilium henryi var. *citrinum*. There are problems with that name, and that's why it's called "a yellow form of Lilium henryi' here. Through most of the twentieth century there were probably only a few such yellow-flowered clones. But yellowflowered plants can be raised from seed, and such seedlings are probably more numerous now than ever. This is an exceptionally graceful and beautiful lily, and it surprises me that this plant has remained so uncommon in gardens. Try to imagine it grouped with blueflowered hydrangeas or the purple flowers of Hosta ventricosa.

Treasurer's Report

At the Directors Meeting held January 20, Jack Roe reported that the society ended the year at \$20.6K, about \$1.5K less than what we started the year. We broke even on the bulb sales, the annual meeting cost about \$100 more than was collected, the annual show cost \$1,268, the newsletter cost about \$250, and publication disbursements were about equal to a receipts. At the current rate of receipts vs. disbursements, PLS has a financial life expectancy of about 10 more years.
